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## Her Majesty Celebrates 90th Birthday!

n Wednesday 20<sup>th</sup> April, the day before her birthday, Queen Elizabeth carried out two official engagements, both in Windsor.

Together with the Duke of Edinburgh, she visited the town's Royal Mail delivery office to mark the 500th Anniversary of the postal service.

Later in the day, she officially opened the new bandstand in Windsor's Alexandra Gardens. The Queen spent her birthday, on Thursday 21 April, at Windsor Castle.

She also gave well-wishers the chance to wish her many happy returns as she unveiled a plaque on the Queen's Walkway, which was opened last year.

Her Majesty's 90<sup>th</sup> Birthday Party was to be a celebration of The Queen's life, her love of horses, her dedication to the Commonwealth and international affairs and her deep involvement with the Navy, Army and Air Force.

Over 90 minutes, 900 horses and more than 1,500 participants from around the United Kingdom and the World created a joyful event for The Queen. The 90-year journey took us from the excitement of her birth, through to World War Two, her marriage, the coronation and a reign of more than 60 years.

The celebration was created by the team that organised the successful Diamond Jubilee Pageant in Windsor in 2012. They used horses, actors, bands and dancers to tell the story. This time, technology also played an important part in the celebration. The 90minute experience was a fusion of the latest video projection, LED effects and theatrical lighting.

Her Majesty then went on a journey with the Duke of Edinburgh to meet members of the public. Then, at 12:00 BST, gun salutes were held at saluting stations across the UK, including Hillsborough Castle, Cardiff Castle, and Edinburgh Castle.

In the evening, she lit the first of almost 1,000 beacons across the UK to mark her birthday. Members of the Army cadet force took beacons to the top of the highest peaks of England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland.

The following day, on 22 April, the Queen hosted US President Barack Obama at Windsor Castle for a private lunch.
